R.C. Stevens, "Quite a Start"


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R.C. Stevens, a 6-foot-5 first baseman for the Pittsburgh Pirates has one of the more memorable starts in major league history ... in his major league debut against the Milwaukee Braves on April 15, 1958, Stevens comes off the bench and goes 2-for-2 and drives home the winning run with a 14th inning single off of Gene Conley of a 4-3 Corsair win.

Four days later (April 19), Stevens hits his first major league home run, a two-run pinch-hit job off Harvey Haddix in a 9-6 loss to the Cincinnati Reds ... the following afternoon, pinch-hitting for Ted Kluszewski, Stevens delivers a two-out "walk-off" homerun off of Reds' reliever Willard Schmidt giving the Pirates a 4-3 victory.

In his first three major league games, Stevens is 4-for-4 with two home runs and four RBIs ... unfortunately for the Moultrie, Ga., native, the downside of his career arrives quickly as he hits just .190 (30-for-158) for the remainder of his four years in the major leagues with the Pirates (1958-1960) and the Washington Senators (1961).

In 1954, Stevens and Herb Bush are the first black players to play for the Burlington-Graham franchise of the Carolina (B) League ... Bush will hit .343 in limited service (70 at bats) for Burlington-Graham while Stevens will lead the team in walks (100), home runs (25) and RBIs (115)

Promoted to the Hollywood Stars of the Pacific Coast League in 1955, Stevens loses out to former Pittsburgh "Bonus Baby" pitcher-turned first baseman Paul Petit in the battle for the starting first base spot.

On December 16, 1960, the Pirates trade Stevens, first baseman Harry Bright and pitcher Bennie Daniels to the expansion Washington Senators for former American League MVP (1952) Bobby Shantz.

On April 10, 1961, in Washington's season opener against the Chicago White Sox, Stevens becomes the first pinch-hitter in team history, replacing catcher Pete Daley in the ninth inning and grounding out against Dick Donovan in a 4-3 loss.

Stevens is hitting just .129 in 33 games, when on June 13, the Senators sell him outright to the Toronto Maple Leafs of the International (AAA) League on June 13.

Stevens will play two more seasons in the minor leagues before retiring after the 1963 season.
