field's Wahconah Park. **Player Suffers** Heart Attack At Ball Game

Catcher Jim Jadwin of the Spartanburg Peaches baseball club was reported in "fairly good" condition by Bruce Rospital authorities last night after suffering a heart attack at the Florence Steelers game.

The 20-year-old catcher, a native of Zanesville, Ohio, keeled over in the eighth inning of the ball game while behind the plate. Dr. John L. Bruce, who reported from the stands when a physician was called, said that the young player suffered a severe convulsion when he was carried to the dugout, and Jadwin was rushed to the hospital.

His condition was serious for a time, but he appeared to be getting along fairly well late last night, hospital authorities reported.

Jadwin had come into the game in the sixth inning, replacing the starting catcher. He had complained of a severe headache during the day, and Manager Kerby Ferrell of the Spartanburg club did not start him.

The small crowd at American Legion Stadium sat in stunner silence as Jadwin was carried off, and few there knew what had happened until after the game was over.

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For Jadwin, his brief appearance is his first of the year after being stricken with flu while in training at Daytona Beach, Florida ... when the Peaches return home to South Carolina, Jadwin collapses on the field ... it's feared that the Zanesville, Ohio., native may have suffered a heart attack, but it is later determined that he took too much of a flu medicine to treat his condition.

In his third year of pro ball, Jadwin will hit .234 over 64 games in his only season with the Indians.
