Erastus Grigg, "Appalachian League's Forgotten Man"

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On February 10, 1939, Ted Wingfield, president of the Appalachian League champion Elizabethton (Tenn.) Betsy Red Sox labels his team's left fielder, and league batting champion, Erastus Grigg, as the circuit's "forgotten man" and blames the situation on the delay in the issuance of the league's final statistics from the 1938 season.

Wingfield believes that the delay in the publication of the final statistics - released on February 3rd and still incomplete - has hindered the advancement of Grigg, first baseman Newell Benton (.300), second baseman Burton Hodge (.295) and other players in the league to higher classifications.

The league's beleaguered statistician blames the six month delay on 20 missing games played at Pennington Gap, Newport and Greenville.

Born Thurman Erastus Grigg on February 12, 1914, in Shelby, North Carolina, Grigg graduates from High Point (N.C.) College in 1938, with a degree in business, and is a three-year starter on the school's baseball team, finishing second as a senior to Wayne "Tige" Harris (.431) in batting with a .403 average.

Following his junior year, Grigg is one of three High Point players committing to play with the Thomasville (N.C.) Chair Makers of the North State

(D) League. Since his signing is announced in the school paper and fearing a loss of

eligibility, Grigg instead elects to play with the Appalachian State (D) League's Elizabethton Red Sox, and plays under an assumed name.

Playing under the alias "Russell Brown", Grigg has a more than productive minor league debut, pounding out nine doubles, 13 triples and three home runs and finishing second in the league with a .343 batting average.

Following graduation from High Point in the spring of 1938, and now

free to use his real name, Grigg returns to Elizabethton and captures the Appalachian League batting title with a .351 average. He also ties with teammate Clovis White and Johnson City's John Hobson for the league leadership in home runs with six.

White later claims some national headlines on October 2, 1938, when he, Ray Kemp and Myrtie Marsh, catch an 18-pound muskie measuring 38 inches on a rod and reel in the Moss Hole on the Barren River near Scottsville, Kentucky.



Erastus Grigg [2 of 2]:

In each of his two seasons with the Red Sox, Grigg is named to the league's all-star team.

Still the property of Elizabethton, Grigg begins the 1939 season on a 10-day trail with the Welch Miners of the Mountain State (D) League. Returned by Welch to Elizabethton during the second week in May, Grigg is hitting .321 when he is sent back to the Miners in exchange for outfielder John Mervar, who is hitting only .244 in 24 games. Grigg hits a combined .320, tying a career-best with six home runs and driving home 52 runs while splitting time between the Miners and the Red Sox.

In his final minor league season in 1940, Grigg hits .289 with two home runs and 38 RBIs, for the Greenwood Chocktaws of the Cotton States (C) League in his final minor league season.

Despite Pearl Harbor being more than a year away, Grigg enlists in the U.S. Army on September 14, 1940, and is discharged on October 29, 1945. He reenlists on June 10, 1946 and remains in another 25 years until his discharge in until June 30, 1971.

Grigg passes away on December 25, 1986, in Petersburg, Virginia at the age of 72.
