Lancaster's 17-year-old shortstop Billy DeMars, who hit a meager .232 in 21 regular season games, keys the comeback with a team-high three RBIs, including the go-ahead RBI in the sixth inning. Twenty-year-old Red Rose third baseman George Kell chips in with a pair of RBIs on two hits.
