Pinch Hits, "Fake News in Kalamazoo"

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On New Year's Day, January 1, 1910, Gabriel Strang, "a well-known and desperate character," and the son of "King" Strang, a one-time Morman ruler of Beaver Island in upper Lake Michigan, is brought to the Michigan city of Kalamazoo, handcuffed and under arrest as a horse thief.

Earlier, following a shoot-out and subsequent capture near the small town of White Pigeon (pop. 600), the desperado with a split personality gives his name to the police as "George Sage."

However, Strang's friends say that the man they know is honest and a benefactor to many, and that the horse thief is the "Sage" side of his personality.

Little is known about our George Sage, the pitcher, other than he:

Attended the University of Michigan, where he supposedly plays on the baseball team.

- Had an older brother, Leo, who also has a brief minor league career as a pitcher.
- Was regarded as a curveball specialist, with repeated references to as the "elongated curvester."

January 1, 1910 Horse thief Gabriel Strang, "a well known and desperate character," is returned to Kalamazoo handcuffed and under arrest. Following a shootout and subsequent capture near White Pigeon, Day gives his name to the police as "George Sage."

Earns the unfortunate nickname "Cannonball," because of the hard way the baseball is hit back through the box when he is on the mound,

By all accounts, never stole a horse in his life.

Sage begins his baseball odyessy in 1907 with the Woodmen of the World semipro team. A year later, Sage debuts professionally with the Kalamazoo White Sox of the Southern Michigan (D) League, going 3-4 in 10 appearances.

August 24, 1908 Pitching for Kalamazoo, Sage pitches out of bases loaded jams twice en route to shutting out Lansing 3-0 on eight hits ... Senator lefty George Pierce allows only.

Two of Sage's four losses on the year are by identical 3-2 scores.

September 13, 1911 Pitching for the Seattle Giants, Sage shuts out Portland 3-0, allowing only three hits and striking out five.

May 15, 1912

Sioux City sells pitcher Walter Miller to

the Zanesville Potters of the Central (B) League and signs George Sage, a " tall youth and is said to have the goods" ... George joins his older brother Leo on the Packers' roster.

August 28, 1912

Sage is 6-11 when he is released by the Sioux City Packers and signs with the St. Joseph Drummers ... Sage is 0-2 with the Drummers.

February 1914 Sage undergoes an appendicitis operation in Rochester, Minnesota.

June 12, 1914

Waco purchases Sage from the Memphis Chickasaws.

June 21, 1914

Sage pitches a four-hit complete game, but drops a 1-0 decision to visiting Galveston.

May 23, 1916

A typical George Sage effort as he limits Houston to three hits and fails to strikeout anyone in a 2-0 shutout of the Buffaloes.

Sioux City's "miniature" Riverside Park is the site of St. Joseph's 8-4 win over the host Packers. Sioux City starting pitcher George Sage takes the loss after being tagged for 12 hits, including five home runs by surging Drummers. Sage's control was near perfect (one walk), but if his "outfielders had been given room to excercise their pedal extremities the chances would have been favorable for a victory." Dutch Zwilling has three of St. Joseph's five home runs and drives in five runs. The future major leaguer has only four home runs in 162 games in 1912 for the Drmmers.
