

Lenoir Reds' right hander Pete Rehkamp pitches a 4-0 no-hitter against the Shelby Colonels in the first game of a Tar Heel (D) League doubleheader.

Rehkamp's masterpiece marks the second-consecutive no-hitter between the two teams as Shelby's Clarence Anderson hurled his first career no-hitter the night before in Shelby. Only six Colonels reach base against Rehkamp, with not one making it as far as second base.

Prior to signing with the Toronto Maple Leafs of the International (AA) League in 1938, Rehkamp plays for the Covington (Ken.) Heidelberg Brewery softball team and is noted for not having made an error in three years with the team. He posts a 33-43 record in four minor league seasons with a career-best 12-8 mark and a 4.26 ERA in 1939, splitting time between Lenoir and Goldsboro of the Coastal Plain (D) League.



## AUTO-TRAIN CRASH KILLS ONE, HURTS TWO

MT. CLEMENS, Sept. 9 (AP)—Private Charles J. Rehkamp, 26, was killed and two other soldiers were injured today when the auto in which they were returning to Selfridge Field collided with a Grand Trunk freight train at a crossing on Hall Road, a half mile north of here. Two empty box cars of the train were derailed in the crash.

Private Rehkamp was dead upon admittance to the base hospital. Private Wayne A. Brown was reported in serious condition there and technical Sergt. John J. White was discharged after treatment of minor injuries.

Entering the Army Air Force in September 1941, the Covington, Kentucky, native is assigned to Selfridge Field in Harrison, Michigan. Rehkamp is a star pitcher on the base's baseball team when on September 9, 1942, he is killed when a car he is traveling in collides with a freight train in nearby Mount Clemens, Michigan.
