

For one "shinning moment" in an otherwise lackluster two-year career, Cordele White Sox rookie right hander Lewis Jobe is in the right spot at the right time.

In winning for only the second time in six decisions, Jobe lasts only five innings but receives more than enough support as the last place White Sox overwhelm the visiting Thomasville Tigers 32-8 in a class D Georgia-Florida league game.

Cordele drives Thomasville starter Wright Patterson from the box in the fourth inning ... Patterson's successors - Joe Ferra, Pat Dove, Joe Batchko and 16-year-old Warren Ward - fare little better as the White Sox score

at least one run in every at bat, including nine tallies in the fourth inning and seven in the fifth ... keyed by 22-year-old catcher Tony Chernetsky's four hits, Cordele hammers out a season-high 21 safeties and takes advantage of 15 Tiger errors in the rout.

Jobe will pitch only two years (1946-1947) in the minors (both with Cordele) finishing 5-12 with a 3.75 ERA in 1946 and 2-8 with a 4.70 ERA a year later.

Pelican State Whitewashings

New Orleans Pelican lefty Jesse Danna shut-outs the visiting Birmingham Barons 4-0 on four hits ... with the win, the Pelicans (22-18) remain four games behind the front-running Atlanta Crackers (31-13) who rally to beat Mobile 6-4 ... a native of the "Crescent City" and a graduate of LSU, Danna wins 114 games in eight minor league seasons and holds the distinction of being the Pelicans' last 20-game winner, compiling a 22-10 record in 1943.

"Diminutive" Baton Rouge Red Sticks moundsman Joe Motichek comes within two outs of no-hitting the visiting Thibodaux Giants in the first game of a Evangeline (D) League doubleheader ... the 5-foot-9 righthander retires the first batter in the top of seventh inning before Thibodaux catcher Sam Demma breaks up the no-hitter lining a single over the head of shortstop John McManus ... Giants' leftfielder Bill Pintar follows with a single to center before Motichek retires the final two batters to preserve a 5-0 shutout.

On July 1, Motichek is released by the last place Red Sticks ... one day later, he is picked up by Evangeline League rival Hammond.
