

# Shine Rumble, "Lenoir-Rhyne Bear"

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On September 29, 1942, 35-year-old Eugene "Shine" Rumble, a former minor league pitcher and now an oil rig contractor from Odessa, Texas, dies at a hospital in the nearby town of Iraan as a result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident two days earlier.

A native of Statesville, North Carolina, Rumble is regarded as one of the "fastest" pitchers in the Tar Heel state. But like many southpaws of his era, his success is hampered by poor control.

Born on April 9, 1907, and one of three sons to Jasper and Mary Bell Rumble, he first garners media attention at nearby Lenoir-Rhyne College as the starting tackle on the football team and then in 1929, as the outstanding pitcher in the "Little Six" Conference.

Leaving Lenoir-Rhyne following his sophomore year, Rumble works the next two years (1929-1930) as a farmer and as a railway employee while finding time to pitch for the semi-pro Kannapolis Towelers.

Rumble signs his first professional contract in February 1930 with the Detroit Tigers but

fails to earn a roster spot with the Piedmont League's Raleigh Capitals in spring training.

A year later, pitching for Stuart (Va.) of the Bi-State League, an 18-team semipro circuit with 10 franchises in North Carolina and eight in Virginia, Rumble wins his first two starts for Stuart before signing with the Greensboro Patriots in September.



Unfortunately for Rumble, he also leads the league in runs allowed (165) wild pitches (15), is third in walks (106) and hit batters (14), fourth in hits allowed (253), and sets a Piedmont League single season record with 24 losses, eclipsing the circuit's previous mark of 21 set by Durham's Lee Reid in 1928.

## Lutheran Line Weakest In Years; Coley And Rumble Lose Places By Studies

November 22, 1928 - Lenoir-Rhyne will be without starting linemen Bill Coley and Eugene Rumble for its upcoming football game with Guilford College at Memorial Stadium in Greensboro. The "Black Hand" of exams sounds the "death knell" for the "hefty" linemen, leaving head coach Dick Gurney's Lutherans with only 17 players. Guilford will claim a 34-6 win in a "featureless game."

## Shine Rumble [2 of 3]:

With the Richmond Colts in 1934, Rumble is 3-6 with a 8.26 ERA in mid-May when he is one of four Colts "suspended" to allow the team to reach a league-mandated 15-player roster limit.

A disgruntled Rumble quits the team in early July and resumes his semipro career signing with the Duchess Fabrics of Greensboro's Tri-County League.

In 1936, Rumble moves to Odessa, Texas where he takes a job as an oil rig contractor.

## RUMPLE CHRONOLOGY

March 30, 1928

Rumble makes his collegiate debut for Lenoir-Rhyne College against Wake Forest College ... the 21-year-old Rumble pitches a four-hit complete game, but loses 2-1 in the bottom of the 10th inning.

March 24, 1929

Pitching for Lenoir-Rhyne, Rumble hurls a five-hitter and strikes out 11 in a 5-2 season opening win over the Oak Ridge Cadets.

April 12, 1929

The "state's best left-hander" allows only six hits in a 8-1 win over Wake Forest.

April 27, 1929

Lenoir-Rhyne head coach Dick Gurley announces that he plans to use Rumble in every remaining "Little Six" contest.

June 11, 1929

Rumble is one of four Lenoir-Rhyne players to sign with the Kannapolis Towelers of the semipro North

Carolina State League.

March 27, 1930

Rumble and Harold Messimer are missing from Lenoir-Rhyne's pitching staff when the Bears open the season against Springfield College ... Rumble has "attached" his signature to a contract with the Detroit Tigers, while Messimer flunks out and enrolls at rival Catawba College in Salisbury, North Carolina.

July 8, 1931

Rumble strikes out 16 as Stuart wins for only the second time in 22 games with a 13-inning, 5-4 win over Martinsville.

September 4, 1931

Rumble signs with the Greensboro Patriots of the Piedmont League and is given the opportunity to pitch for the third-place Patriots during the final week of the season ... Rumble, who opened the season with the Raleigh Capitals before

## STUART WINS BI-STATE GAME IN 13TH BY 5-4

Martinsville, Va., July 8.—Two left-handers, Williams for Martinsville and Rumble for Stuart, hooked up in a great pitchers' battle this afternoon at Stuart, it requiring 13 innings before Stuart won out by a count of 5 to 4.

Both pitchers were in rare form and were tight with men on bases. Rumble struck out 16, while Williams fanned 11.

With the score four runs all in the fifth it was shutout baseball until the last of the 13th, as darkness appeared. It was Stuart's second victory in 22 starts this season. Brown, Bell and Payen, of Stuart, and Boulding and Hurd, of Martinsville, led in the hitting. Dixon, of Stuart, hit for the circuit.

is survived by his wife Ruth and two daughters, Elizabeth and Faye.

## Expect Lanning To Join Patriot Outfit Tonight

John Lanning, ace pitcher of the N. C. State college team, who recently signed with the St. Louis Cardinals, will join the Greensboro Patriots in Raleigh tonight, according to announcement here today by Oliver French, business manager of the club.

The addition of Lanning is the start of a shake-up expected to take place in the Patriot roster, and several other changes are anticipated for next week.

Eugene "Shine" Rumble, southpaw hurler who formerly pitched for the Lenoir-Rhyne Bears, will be suspended to make room on the roster for Lanning, who will probably get a chance to hurl in one of the games next week.

## 'Shine' Rumble Is Fatally Hurt In Wreck In Texas

E. P. (Shine) Rumble, 35, well-known baseball player, native of Iredell County, was killed in an automobile accident Thursday at Odessa, Texas. He played baseball for several years with the Piedmont League and was later pitcher for the Twins baseball team in Winston-Salem. He is a son of Mr. Jasper Rumble, who lives in the Sharon school community of Iredell County.

The following item is from today's issue of the Winston-Salem Journal:

The body of Eugene Presley (Shine) Rumble, 35, formerly of Winston-Salem and one-time pitcher for the Twins baseball club, will arrive here Thursday morning for funeral rites and burial, arrangements to be announced later.

Services are to be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at his home in Odessa, Texas, and the body will be put on a train there tonight, scheduled to arrive here at 8:10 a. m. Thursday.

Mr. Rumble, injured in an automobile accident Thursday, died at an Odessa, Texas, hospital Saturday morning. He had been making his home in Texas for the past seven years, employed as an oil rigger contractor.

Reports received here Saturday asserting that his wife, the former Miss Ruth Snow, of this city, was in the automobile accident with him proved erroneous, it was learned last night. Mrs. Rumble has been ill and was a hospital patient, but has already returned to her home.

Mr. Rumble was born near Statesville on April 9, 1907, a son of J. M. and Mary Bell Rumble. He spent his early life in Statesville, attended the public schools and Lenoir-Rhyne College, and then was employed as a farmer and railway worker for some time before entering professional baseball. He played for several years in the Piedmont League and was widely known in this section.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church at Odessa, and was well known in fraternal circles.
