On August 4, 1945, in the second game of a doubleheader with the Boston Red Sox, two Washington Senators pitchers - Joe "Fire" Cleary and Bert Shepard - make their first, and only major league appearances before 13,035 in Washington's Griffith Stadium.

Washington had won the opener 4-0, behind the fourhit pitching of Wally Holborow. For the 30-year-old Holborow, it marks the only start, complete game and shutout in his brief three year (1944-45 & 1948) major league career.

Cleary and Shepard receive their opportunities in part because of an outstanding effort by Red Sox left fielder Tom McBride who ties a major league record by driving in six runs in a 12-run fourth inning.

The 30-year-old McBride doubles off of Washington starter Santiago Ullrich (a member of the Cuban Baseball Hall of Fame) and then triples against reliever Joe Cleary, each hit coming with the bases loaded. Joe Cronin's Red Sox bat around against the unfortunate Cleary, who yields seven runs on five hits and three walks in one-third of an inning.

Cleary, the 40th, and last major leaguer to be born in Ireland, strikes out Boston pitcher Dave Ferriss for the only out in his brief major league career. Following McBride's bases-clearing double that makes the score 14-2, the 26-year-old Cleary is unceremoniously removed from the game by Senator manager Ossie Bluege, who simply waves at him from the dugout to leave the mound.

An angry Cleary swears at Bluege when he reaches the dugout and is relieved by Shepard, who strikes out left-handed hitting George "Catfish" Metkovich on a 3-2 pitch to end the inning. When Shepard enters the game, he is still a lieutenant in the Army Air Corp and becomes he first player with an artificial leg to pitch in a major league baseball game. He pitches 5 1/3 innings of impressive relief, allowing only one run on three hits, striking out two and walking one.



Most Destructive Force in World's History Hurled at Japan to Hasten End of Conflict

Two days later (August 6), the United States, in an effort to bring an end to World War II in the Pacific, drops an atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima and Cleary's major league career come to an end when his contract is sold to the Buffalo Bisons.

Cleary will end his major league career with an ERA of 189.00 - the highest of any pitcher who records at least one out in a major league game - while Shepard will depart with a nifty 1.69 ERA.

In May of 1944, Shepard, on his 34th combat mission, is strafing a German truck convoy when his P-38 Lightning fighter is shot down by anti-aircraft fire. Severely injured in the resulting crash and captured, German doctors are later forced to amputate Shepard's right leg 11 inches below the knee.

During his recovery he is transferred to a Stalag prison camp at Meiningen, in central Germany. It's there that a fellow prisoner crafts a makeshift artificial leg.

Joe Cleary & Bert Shepard [1 of 2]:

In February 1945, Shepard returns to the United States as a result of a prisoner exchange with the German government. The 25-year-old Dana, Indiana, native, who had pitched for three years (1940-42) in the low minor leagues prior to the war, attempts a return to baseball.

During spring training in 1945, Shepard impresses the Senators enough to be hired as a pitching coach and to throw batting practice.

On August 31, three weeks after making his major league debut, Shepard receives the Distinguished Flying Cross, between games of a doubleheader with the New York Yankees. Following his release by the Senators on September 4, he continues to pitch three more years in the minor leagues (1946, 1949 & 1955), compiling a 8-12 record in 38 appearances.

Cleary's strange road to the major leagues

July 5

With a 10-5 mark and a 4.58 ERA, Cleary is one of five Chattanooga Lookouts named to the 1945 Southern Association All-Star team.

July 9

For the second time in as many seasons, Cleary, a malaria victim while serving in the military, returns home to "rest".

August 1

Three weeks after an upset Cleary leaves the Chattanooga Lookouts because the Washington Senators fail to bring him up to the majors after he is named to the Southern Association's All-Star team, the Senators announce that team owner Calvin Griffith consents to giving Cleary a trial with the team because Cleary's "mother is the hospital and the veteran pitcher needed a job."

Because Mother Ill, Pitcher Gets Chance

Chattanooga, Tenn. (P)—Joe Cleary, who left the Lookouts three weeks ago after winning 10 games and dropping five, has joined the Washington Senators, The Chattanooga front office announced Wednesday.

Owner Clark Griffith of the Senators and Lookouts, consented to give Cleary, a New Yorker, a trial with the Nats because his mother is in a hospital and the veteran pitcher needed a job, the front of-

fice said.
