Ad Holzhauser, "A Man for All Uniforms"

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"He has more stuff than he knows what to do with." - Beaumont Enterprise, April 14,1927

September 2, 1931 - Facing a key three-game season-ending series with the visiting Evansville Hubs, Bloomington Cubs' manager Joe Kelly names veteran right-hander Ad Holzhauser to be his game one starter. A late-season free agent acquistion from Binghamton of the New York-Penn League, the well-travelled right-hander is 3-2 with three complete games for the Cubs, his third team of the season.

However, in his last start four days earlier against the Terre Haute Tots, the 36-year-old "saliva slabster" had yielded eight runs on eight hits and three walks in only 3 1/3 innings. Evansville manager Bob Coleman, whose Hubs (40-24) trail first-place Quincy (40-22) by one game with three games remaining, counters Holzhauser with 16-game winner Dick Schultz.



Despite a heavy rainfall the night before and a light drizzle that morning, the temperature hovers around 60 degrees when the crowd of 300 settles in for the Three-I League game at 30-year-old Fans Field.

Holzhauser opens the contest by striking out leadoff hitter Tony Governor. Skeeter Newsome follows by popping up to shortstop Roy Beckwith for out No. 2. With future Hall of Famer Hank Greenberg swinging a couple of bats on deck, Hub blonde centerfielder Fred Tauby finds one of Holzhauser's offerings his liking and drives the pitch back at "Adolph's underpinning so ferociously," that it splinter's Holzhauser's shin, forcing his removal from the game. Holzhauser is replaced by 25-year-old Hy Vandenberg, who allows eight hits and strikes out six in 8 1/3 innings en route to recording his eighth win with the Cubs.

And with that pitch, Ad Holzhauser's career comes to an abrupt end.




Ad Holzhauser 1922 Decatur Commodores

It's not known if the Portland, Missouri, native stays in the dugout to watch the Bees pound four Evansville hurlers (including the before-mentioned Greenberg) for 18 hits in a 19-4 win.

The Hubs (42-28) will win only two of their last six games and finish two games back of Quincy (42-28) for the second half championship while Bloomingham finishes fifth with a 31-39 mark.

At the beginning of his career, Holzhauser is known as a curveball artist with an above-average fastball. Later, as the innings take their toll, salivates up and becomes a noted emery and spitball pitcher. In 13 minor league seasons, Holzhauser is 119-100-1. In the first three years of his career he is 49-16-1 (.750), over the last 10, he is 70-84-1 (.455). Of his 156 career complete games, 20 are shutouts. On five occasions he plays for a pennant-winning team, four times for cellar-dwelling organizations. He wins 20 games twice, including a career-best 25 in 1922.

Ad Holzhauser [2 of 9]:

Adolph Merlin Holzhauser is born on September 19, 1984, in <u>Portland, Missouri</u>. His father, a prosperous farmer, is a first-generation immigrant from Baden, Germany, while his mother Annie is a native Missourian.

A noted semipro pitcher, Holzhauser is one of six "youngsters" that are invited to St. Louis in July, 1916, to try out and hopefully earn a spot within the Cardinals' organization. He fails to impress the Red Bird brass that summer, but three years later he makes his pro debut as a 24-year-old on September 13, 1919, with the Western League's Tulsa Oilers. In his first full pro season the following year, he is 9-3 with a 2.56 ERA for the Okmulgee Drillers of the Western (D) Association before being sold to the Western (A) League's Tulsa Oilers.

In 1921, Holzhauser is 14-3-1 and two saves with the Independence Producers, a team that captures the Southwestern (D) League's pennant by 19 games with a 103-38 record. All three of his losses are by one run with the Producers totalling five runs in the setbacks. He leads the team in shutouts (6) and is tied with 28-game winner Jewell Campbell in complete games (20) when his contract is purchased on July 6, for \$3,500 by the American (AA) Association's Kansas City Blues. With the Blues, he is 1-1 with a 8.65 ERA and walks 37 in 51 innings.

Ad Holzhauser [3 of 9]:

In the off-season, Kansas City sends Holzhauser to the Decatur Commodores with instructions to work on his control. Under the guidance of manager Dan O'Leary, a former catcher and noted handler of pitchers, Holzhauser responds with a career year leading the Three-I League in wins (24) and ERA (2.17) while finishing second in strikeouts (166). In five of his nine losses, the 28-year-old allows three runs or less. He completes all 28 of his starts with six shutouts, but more importantly he walks only 62 in 269 2/3 innings.

Not Exactly Popular

August 17, 1923 - The Rockford Republic

"Another story that made its appearance in Decatur fandom was that Bourg, Lamb and Novak had beaten up one Holzhauser during the last road trip of the Commies. Whlle we doubt that they did we don't doubt but what any member of the Decatur team would like to do it. Holzhauser gets the watch for being the most egotistical hurler in the Three-I League." With the Kansas City Blues in time for their spring training in 1923, he is one of three players released on April 12. The Blues attempt to sneak Holzhauser through American Association waivers to Oklahoma City, but the St. Paul Saints put in a claim for his services. Despite the Saints legitimate claim, Holzhauser reports to Oklahoma City and is 1-1 with a pair of complete games when he is told to report to St. Paul where he debuts on June 1. In his abbreviated season in the northern latitudes he is 5-4 with a 4.76 ERA as

the 111-win Saints fall just short of claiming the American Association pennant by two games to the Kansas City Blues.

A year later, Holzhauser spends the entire season with one team for the first time in his career. He starts the campaign in St. Paul's starting rotation and he is 6-2 with five complete games and a save in his first nine outings. Over the rest of the season he is 4-10 and on July 22, following a difficult two-inning start against Toledo, he is removed from the starting rotation and will pitch

On September 14, 1919, as a 15-year-old he his 2-for-3 with a home run in the season finale for the Western League's Joplin Miners while a student at Drury College and a member of the school's football team. Windle is a star shortstop in the Texas League for four seasons with Fort Worth and Waco. In the late 1930s, he is a part owner of the Texarkana club and helps form the East Texas League.

seven innings or longer once over the remainder of the season. Twice he starts a game but is removed after facing only three batters. On August 15, he allows 17 runs on 10 hits and seven walks in a two-inning start against Louisville. He finishes 10-12 with 10 complete games and an elevated 5.68 ERA.


Plagued by a sore arm in 1925, Holzhauser pitches inconsistently in the first couple of weeks of his third season with St. Paul. After five appearances with the Saints his contract is purchased by Des Moines of the Western League on May 21. With Des Moines he becomes a part of the league's most formidable starting rotations. Led by Leo Moon's 22 wins, the top four starters - Holzhauser (19), Claude Thomas (19) and side-winder James House (13) - combine for 73 of the team's 98 wins as Joe Mathes' Demons capture the league flag by one game over Denver.

Back with St. Paul again in time for the team's 1926 season opener, Holzhauser is 1-1 with a 2.17 ERA when he draws his release on May 12, in a general housecleaning by the team's management. Picked up by the Texas League's Dallas Steers he is 2-6 in 13 appearances when the Steer management true to condition of the Carrisona Oilors on July 7. But similar

management trys to send him to the Corsicana Oilers on July 7. But similar to four years earlier, a league team puts in a claim for his services and he ends up with the Beaumont Exporters. For the season he is 7-14 with 10 complete games and a 3.79 ERA.

Holzhauser's next two seasons spent in Beaumont are mostly forgettable as the Exporters are a combined 106-203 (.343) and post back-to-back lastplace Texas League finishes. In 1927 and 1928, he is a combined 9-23-1 with 18 complete games and a 5.52 ERA in 39 starts and the 1927 season turns out to be the low point of his career.

Suffering from several illnesses, including a mid-season attack of tonsilitis, he is 5-9 with a careerworst 7.25 ERA. In all fairness, Magnolia Ballpark, the team's home field, is an extreme "band box" of its era, with the right field line measuring only 260 feet. A a vertical line was painted on the fence in right field, towards the alley in right center field. The ballpark's ground rules had that anything hit over the fence to the right of that line was a ground rule double.

Ad Holzhauser [4 of 9]:

After two-and-a-half seasons in the heat and humiidty (not to mention the little league rightfield foul line), Holzhauser elects to leave Beaumont and re-signs with the Des Moines Deamons where he won 19 games four years earlier. Unfortunately success is fleeting for the 34-year-old as he is 1-6 with two saves when he and outfielder Chief Wano are released on May 30, to make room for pitcher Ted Pillette and college outfielder Tommy Hughes.




Bill Wano

A 33-vear-old teammate of Holzhauser with the Des Moines Demon in 1929, Bill "Chief" Wano is hitting an uncharacteristically low .248 when he and Holzhauser are released on May 30. Born on the Pottawatomie Tribe reservation in Oklahoma on May 12, 1896, An Army veteran, Wano serves with the 79th Infantry, 15th Division at Camp Logan, Texas. In 1928, Wano hits a career-high .343 for the Pueblo Steelworkers. On July 30, 1945, Wano, a guard in the North American Aviation Plant in Dallas, is being held in city jail when according to reports he is punched by another prisoner and falls hitting his head on the floor. The 48-year-old Wano dies that night. No charges are ever filed in his death.

Signing with Wilkes-Barre of the New York-Penn League on June 16, he doesn't pitch for the Barons until the 23rd because of a swollen right arm that he thinks was caused from an insect bite he received while traveling in a sleeper from his home in Missouri. Following a brief four-week stay with Punch Knoll's last-place Barons, he draws his second release of the season on July 21. He quickly signs with Elmira and for the Colonels one day later.

With Elmira, Holzhouser resurrects his career going 25-9 with a 3.45 ERA with 27 complete games and three shutouts in 35 starts over his first two seasons in the county seat of Chemung County. In 1930 he starts the season 7-0 and his eventual 18 wins rank second in the league while his .783 winning percentage, with a 18-5 record, is tops among all pitchers.

Believing he has one more season left in his well-travelled right-arm, a 36-year Hozhauser returns to Elmira in 1931, but is 1-3 in four starts when he draws his outright release on

May 25. Signing with league for Binghamton, he is an immediate success winning his first two starts allowing only one run and 12 hits and securing his last career shutout, blanking Elmira 10-0. However, after failing to work into the fifth inning in three-straight starts, he draws the final release of his career on July 10. On August 3, Holzhauser signs with the Three-I Bloomington Cubs, his last stop in a 13-year career.

Following his playing days, Holzhauser returns to his family farm in Missouri. On January 7, 1968, he suffers a cerebral hemorrhage and passes away at the age of 73.

HOLZHAUSER CHRONOLOGY

June 8, 1915

Pitching for the Invincibles of Mokane, Missouri, 20-year-old Holzhauser strikes out 15 and allows only five hits in a 15-inning, 3-2 win over the Marthasville Browns.

July 1916

Holzhauser is one of six "youngsters" that are invited to St. Louis to try and earn a position within the Cardinals organization. The players are: pitcher Oscar Horstman of the PCL's Los Angeles Angels, pitcher Mule Watson, a pitcher for the Paris, Texas, club; an infielder named Dorris of Harrisburg, Illinois, pitcher and contract jumper Joe Lotz, and local semipro Bill Brinkop.

June 29, 1919

Pitching for a semipro team from Boonville, Holzhauser has a no-hitter until the bottom of the 10th inning when visiting Moberly scores twice on two hits.

July 27, 1919

Holzhauser stikes out 23 as Boonville beats Keytesville and Pittsburgh Pirate spitball pitcher and holdout Roy Sanders ... Sanders is working in the ticket office at Kansas City's <u>Union Station</u> ... despite several offers, Sanders elects to stay in the semipro ranks as he says he makes more money then when he pitched for the Pirates.

Signing with Tulsa in August, Holzhauser makes his pro debut with the Oilers ... relieving 20-year-old and future major leaguer Bill Bayne, he pitches a scoreless ninth inning in a 20-7 win over Sioux City.

February 7, 1920

Holzhauser is considered as a "better-thaneven chance" of making the Tulsa Oilers' opening day roster for the upcoming season ... even if a "trifle" wild, he has shown so much ability that he is considered a srong contender for the starting rotation.

May 4, 1920

Holzhauser picks up his first professional win in Okmulgee's 11-8 win over Enid ... he relieves starter Blevins with two outs in the bottom first inning with the Harvesters ahead 4-0.

April 22, 1921

An opening day starter for the first time in his career, Holzhauser strikes out seven and allows five hits in a 13-8 win over Parsons.

April 26, 1921

Holzhauser turns in his first nine-inning shutout out-dueling Parsons' future major leaguer Oscar Roettger in a four-hit 1-0 win.

Holzhauser is 14-3-1 when his contract is purchased for \$3,500 by the American (AA) Association's Kansas City Blues.

April 5, 1922

Holzhauser is one of six players released by the Kansas City Blues to the Decatur Commodores of the Three-I (B) League.

May 12, 1922

Holzhauser has a no-hitter until one out in the ninth inning when John Command, a .342 hitter at season's end, singles to left-center ... he ends the game with a one-hitter and a 4-1 win.

May 21, 1922

Forced to travel 60 miles by car on back roads after a Rock Island Railroad wreck at Lafayette, the Decatur players arrive in Bloomington a little after 4 p.m., only 30 minutes before the scheduled 4:30 start ... Holzhauser allows a one run on only two hits, but that single tally is enough for the host Bloomers



to claim a 1-0 win behind Millikin University product Randoph Young's no-hitter.

June 16, 1922 Holzhauser is 4-for-4 and strikes out seven and does not walk a batter in a 6-1 win over Peoria.

Ad Holzhauser [6 of 9]:

August 17, 1922

It was an all-around "Holzhauser Day" as the slender right-hander not only wins his 22nd game of the year in a complete game effort, but hits for the cycle in Decatur's 5-4 win over visiting Rockford.

September 18, 1922

One week after the end of the season and posting a league-best 24-11 record, Holzhauser is recalled by the Kansas City Blues.

ST. PAUL, April 23.—Pitchers Holzhauser and Songer, who were sent to the Western league for sea-soning by the Kansas City baseball club, will be claimed by the St. Paul American association team through the walver system.

-Kansas City neglected to secure walvers on the players before send-ing them to Oklahoma City.

April 26, 1923

Holzhauser pitches his second complete game in as many starts for Oklahoma City before being claimed off of waivers by the St. Paul Saints of the American Association.

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Holzhauser's problems with the Louisville Colonels continues as he is torched for 17 run on 10 hits and seven walks in two innings of work. A Ladies' Day crowd of 5,003 watched the Colonels set an American Association record for a margin of victory, eclipsing Toledo's 22-1 earlier in the season on July 29. Righthander Tom Estell allows only two singles in recording his second shutout of the year. In his last four starts against Louisville, Holzhauser has allowed 27 runs on 17 hits and 13 walks in only 10 innings of work.

en route to a 4-0 victory ... with the twin whitewashing of the Mud Hens, the Saints maintain their 3-game lead over the second-place Kansas City Blues.

June 16, 1924

In the shortest start in his career to date, Holzhauser has a hit batter and two walks in the bottom of the first inning against Louisville ... relieved by Paul Fittery after a walk to Sam Covington, all three runners come around to score ... the Colonels score a run in the bottom of the ninth inning to eventually post a 5-4 win.

June 24, 1924

Holzhauser lasts 1/3 of an inning in a 14-5 loss at Toledo ... over his last three appearances, he has allowed 15 runs on 10 hits and six walks in only 2 2/3 innings.

Julv 8, 1924

Following two complete game wins, Holzhauser, for the second time in five starts lasts only three batters as Louisville scores seven first inning runs en route to a 13-5 victory ... in his last two starts against the Colonels, he has allowed six runs on five walks and a hit batter while not retiring a batter.

September 28, 1924

With the pennant "safely tucked away," St. Paul's young mascot Pat Reilly plays one inning in the first game of a season-ending doubleheader with Louisville ... Reilly doubles and later scores in his only at bat against 24-game winner Ben Tincup.

May 21, 1925

Holzhauser is 1-1 for the St. Paul Saints when his contract is purchased by the Western League's Des Moines Demons.


Holzhauser is 11-5 with 14 complete games and is named to the mid-season Western League all-star team.

Holzhauser's first-ever appearance in the state of Texas proves successful in Waco's Katy Park. He allows two runs on seven hits and seven walks and Moose Woeber hits one of his 25 home runs on the year as Dallas (23-14) maintains its 1/2 game lead on San Antonio (23-15) with a 12-2 victory over last-place Waco (14-24).

May 12, 1926

In a general house cleaning, Holzhauser despite a 2.17 ERA in seven appearances, is released by St. Paul.

May 22, 1926

Doing his first workout for the Dallas Steers, Holzhauser almost "wilts" under the Texas sun.

May 24, 1926

Two days after arriving in Dallas, Holzhauser makes his first-ever appearance in the state proves successful as he allows two runs on seven hits in 12-2 win over Waco.

June 19, 1926

After pitching four times in nine days and losing three times, Dallas manager Snipe Conley decides to give a struggling Holzhauser eight days off and Holzhauser responds with a 1-0, five-hit shutout of Houston.

Holzhauser is 2-6 in 13 appearances with Dallas when the Steer management elects to send him to the Corsicana Oilers after the Texas (D) Association team loses the services of former major league pitcher <u>Suds Sutherland</u> due to illness ... Holzhauser does not pitch in a game for the Oilers and instead ends up back in the Texas League with the Beaumont Exporters.

February 1927

Holzhauser is listed on the Beaumont Exporters' pre-season roster.

Holzhauser had the "one-run" affliction with the Dallas Steers, meaning that he had the penchant for losing games by the narrowest of margins.

May 6, 1927

July 30, 1927

Holzhauser makes his first appearance for Beaumont in 22 days as a pinch-hitter against Fort Worth ... his absence from the Exporter rotation has been the "cause for much unfair comment" ... suffering from tonsillitis, he is scheduled for another examination and

tonsillitis, he is scheduled for another examination and it is possible he will be out for several more weeks.

August 15, 1927

The body of Beaumont outfielder <u>Rebel Dunning</u>, who died at Shreveport early Sunday morning, reaches Dixon Mills, Alabama for burial. ... Dunning's body is escorted to his home by Holzhauser.

January 28, 1928

The Beaumont Enterprise opines that Holzhauser, coming off his worst season as a pro, is "due for a trade."

May 20, 1928

Holzhauser allows eight hits, strikes out and hits his ninth career home run in Beaumont's 9-2 win over San Antonio.

May 30, 1929

Having lost five in a row and allowing 22 runs in his last 16 innings, Holzhauser and outfield <u>Chief</u> <u>Wano</u> are released by Des Moines to make room for pitcher <u>Ted Pillette</u> and college outfielder <u>Tommy Hughes</u> ... Pillette, recently released by Omaha where he was 3-6, will go 4-14 for Des Moines ... Hughes will hit .281 in 84 games with the Demons.

June 16, 1929

Holzhauser signs with the Wilkes-Barre Barons of the New York-Penn (B) League.

August 11, 1930

A day after picking up his first win of the season, Holzhauser draws his release from Elmira.

June 1, 1931

Signing with Binghamton, Holhauser makes his Triplett debut with a six-hit complete game win over Williamsport, 2-1.

July 7, 1931

Holzhauser is 2-3 in nine outings with Binghamton when he is "fired" by manager Heinie Groh to make room for pitcher Hollis McLaughin.

August 3, 1931

August 7, 1931 In his first start for Bloomington, Holzhauser pitches a complete game win over Quincy.

September 3, 1931

In what turns out to be the last appearance in his career, Holzhauser is forced to leave the game with two outs in the first inning when a line drive off the bat of Evansville Hub centerfielder Fred Tauby hits his shin, forcing his removal from the game.

January 7, 1968

Two days after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage, Adolph Merlin Holzhauser passes away in his home-

town of Portland, Missouri at the age of 73.

Guy Dunning, Popular Baseball Player, Dead

Interment of the remains of Guy Dunning, who died suddenly in Shreveport in the early hours of Sunday morning was made at Dixons Mills Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, in the presence of a large concourse of sorrowing relatives, friends and admirers.

Guy, who was a member of the Beaumont club of the Texas League, was playing in Shreveport at the time he was stricken. It was stated by teammates that he had played an unusually hard game and shortly after went to his hotel, where he felt a touch of cramps, an ailment to which he was subject. He prepared to take a hot bath, as this treatment had always given him relief, but soon after getting in the bathtub the pains became more acute and he realized that he was in a serious condition. He informed a teammate of his condition and a physician was immediately called in, but being unable to give him relief, the physician called in Dr. B. C. Garrett and they rushed him to the hospital, where they labored with him all night in vain, death claiming him at 3:10 o'clock Sunday morning.
