

Austin Senators "44-0"

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On July 23, 1907, on a hot Tuesday afternoon in Austin's Riverside Park, the home-standing Senators post one of the most lopsided wins in professional baseball history, blanking the visiting San Antonio Bronchos, 44-0, in the second game of a Texas (C) League double-header.

In the first game, a controversial call by umpire Schuster, results in the eighth inning ejection of San Antonio's Sam LaRocque and Pat Newman. The rest of the San Antonio players leave the field in protest and following a slight delay, Schuster forfeits the game to Austin, which was trailing 5-4 at the time. Between games, city police have their hands full keeping order among upset fans.

An angry San Antonio team decides to get even in the second game. The Bronchos bat in haphazard order and "generally make a farce of the game".

Austin pounds out a season-high 33 hits, including six home runs and steals 23 bases. The Senators open the proceedings with a 12-run first inning and tally at least one run in every stanza but the third inning. Amazingly, the box score lists the game as being played in a nifty one hour and 48 minutes.

Twenty-two-year-old infielder Art Griggs is San Antonio's starting pitcher in the second game. Griggs is relieved by another infielder, Ike Pendleton, and later by outfielder George "Cap" Leidy.

While the second game is in progress, a petition is circulated through the grandstand and signed by numerous disgruntled fans protesting the conduct of the San Antonio players to Texas League President William Robbie.

Austin Senators [2 of 2]:

Ten days after the game, it's announced that Schuster, the game's umpire and the object of San Antonio's scorn, has been signed by the National League to be on its umpiring staff in 1908. In early September, San Antonio's 44-year-old player/manager Sam La Rocque will end a 22-year career in professional baseball when he leaves the team to enter private business in Canada. Twenty-six-year-old Pat Newman succeeds LaRocque as the team's manager.



Art Griggs

Two years after being San Antonio's starting pitcher in the 44-0 loss to Austin, Art Griggs will make his major league debut with the St. Louis Browns. The Topeka, Kansas, native will play 22 seasons in professional baseball, including six years in the majors, where he hits .277 with five home runs and 152 RBIs.

At the age of 25, Austin center fielder Ed Cermak is already six years removed from his playing days in the major leagues. The Cleveland, Ohio., native plays one game with his hometown Indians on September 9, 1901. In a 4-1 win, Cermak strikes out in each of his four at bats against 30-year-old Philadelphia Athletics pitcher Bill Bernhard.

Bill McGill

Bill McGill, the game's winning pitcher, is considered one of the best pitchers in the Texas League, "he has everything, speed, curves, raise ball, spitter and change of pace." On August 25, McGill pitches a five-inning no-hitter against the Bronchos.



McGill's shutout of San Antonio is the middle game of a three-game stretch of games where the 27-year-old Galva, Kansas, native will pitch 20 innings of scoreless baseball while allowing only four hits and walk.
