Fog Again Causes Buc Game To Be Called

For a second straight night the Galveston Buccaneers have a Texas (A1) League game postponed because of dense fog at Moody Field.

Two Games Set for Tonight, First Starting at 8 p. m.; Play Halted After 2 Frames

With the Oklahoma City Indians in town for the first game of a three-game series, the game is scoreless at the end of two innings when a heavy fog rolls in over the outfield fence ultimately forcing the postponement.

"The fog was rolling in so thick that you couldn't read the signs on the outfield fence, and the wire in front of the grandstand became so wet that every ball batted or thrown against it meant a shower for the people sitting close." - The Galveston Daily News.

The Buccaneers' game the previous night with the Tulsa Oilers is also postponed because of thick fog ... between 1800 and 2000 fans are in the stands when the game is called ... the previous night, about 1,500 fans were in attendance on a special "Ladies Night" affair.

Lew Krausse pitches Elmira to an 8-1 victory over Williamsport in the season opener for both teams in the New York-Penn (A) League; coming a 24-win season and staked to a five run first inning lead, Krausse scatters nine hits in spoiling the Grays home opener before some 3,000 fans ... in **New Castle, Pennsylvania**, South Side Board of Trade manager Charles Scaglione announces the signing of Butchelli of Wampum, and Marshall of Hillsville, for a tryout with the team at the Rosena Furnace field this evening ... the **Fort Worth Cats** tally 11 runs in the top of the ninth inning en route to handing the first place Beaumont Exporters an 11-2 defeat in Texas League play ... **St. Louis Cardinals** president Sam Breadon discloses that pitcher Paul "Daffy" Dean's salary has been "revised downward" due to Dean's sore right arm and his inability to take a "regular turn" on the mound ... **Hawley** (Texas) defeats Noodle 3-2 for its first victory in five games; three of Hawley's first four games have gone into extra innings; Noodle (population 40) is located ten miles north of Merkel and gets its name from nearby Noodle Creek, which according to local folk lore means "nothing," signifying a dry creek bed ... the **Cleveland Indians** announce that Bob Feller's "million dollar pitching arm" has improved after receiving four days of treatment; Dr. E.B. Castle, the team's physician, says that the tearing of a few fibers below the elbow should not keep the star hurler on the sidelines for the entire season.
